

## MONTHLY REPORT FOR JULY 2011

### POLICE ACTIVITY:

- The department handled 1642 Law Incidents for the month, issued 148 infractions, 44 criminal traffic citations, 19 criminal citations, 19 parking infractions and made 121 criminal arrests.
- During the month, Animal Control Officer Bob Hill handled 110 "animal problem" calls, 11 abandoned vehicles, 4 code enforcement issues and 8 parking complaints. A total of 35 animals were impounded.
- WEEKEND JAIL SESSION #7: The department conducted the seventh weekend jail session of 2011 starting on Saturday, July 9<sup>th</sup> through court on Tuesday, July 12<sup>th</sup>. A total of 27 prisoners were booked into the City Jail at the police station (21 male/ 6 female). One inmate was a court commitment sentence where the defendant was able to serve his or her time here instead of at a contract jail facility (at \$45 to \$58/ day to the city). Two other inmates were transferred from the county jail to the city jail. A total of seven prisoners posted \$13,350 in bail to secure release pending court. By court on Tuesday, five defendants were held in continued custody and transported to a contract jail facility for further proceedings. A total of 39 warrants were cleared by arrest.
- On July 4, 2011 at 2256 hours, officers were dispatched to a report of glass breaking at a business located in the 300 block of 10<sup>th</sup> Street. Upon arrival, officers found a window broken in the front door. The door was unlocked and it was obvious someone had entered the building. In checking the location, officers determined a firearm had been stolen and several service vans in the back fenced yard had the windows smashed out. At some point, the suspect cut himself and left a trail of blood at the scene. Given the nature of the damage and what was taken, a former employee was suspected. Officers processed the scene for fingerprints and collected blood samples for DNA testing. The former employee was located and he had a cut on his hand but denied the burglary. Felony charges are now pending the DNA test results.
- Officers responded to a liquor establishment in the 900 block of Chenault Avenue on July 7, 2011 at 0052 hours for a report of a man with a knife. Upon arrival, the suspect fled and had to be chased down on foot. Officers arrested a 24-year old Ellensburg man for unlawful display of a weapon after he was kicked out of the bar, but returned with a knife and made threats against the bartender and crowd inside. The suspect was cited and released.
- On July 7, 2011 at 0932 hours, officers checked an old mill site in the 1100 block of Alameda Street in Woodlawn for a trespasser apparently stealing scrap metal. Officers searched the woods and arrested a 42-year old Hoquiam man for trespass/ theft as well as an outstanding felony warrant for possession of methamphetamine.
- At the conclusion of the monthly warrant sweep on Tuesday, July 12, 2011, PSO Kinney attempted to prepare a female inmate for transport to the Forks Jail after she was held on bail by the judge. The 38-year old Aberdeen woman refused to go "to Forks" and had to be physically pulled from the cell and subdued. She was transported and booked at the Forks Jail.

- On July 13, 2011 at 2239 hours, officers responded to an apparent overdose in the 900 block of Fourth Street. While assisting the paramedics at the scene (who were attempting to save the 26-year old female) Sgt. Salstrom was confronted by a 44-year old man who claimed to be a neighbor. The man refused to step back from the ambulance so the doors could be closed; he claimed to be a "reverend" and wanted to give the female her "Last Rites". The family did not request this man's presence and he refused to move back even under the threat of arrest. The suspect was finally arrested and cited for obstructing a public servant as he refused the orders of the officers and interfered with the treatment provided by the paramedics. The female overdose victim survived.
- As a result of the proactive patrol work of Officer Blundred, he was able to thwart a 15-year old Aberdeen vehicle prowler dressed all in black in the 2300 block of Aberdeen Avenue on July 13, 2011 at 0150 hours. In addition to trying to get into vehicles along the street, Officer Blundred discovered the juvenile was carrying marihuana and drug paraphernalia. The suspect was referred to the juvenile prosecutor for charges.
- On July 16, 2011 at 1300 hours, officers served a search warrant at a residence in the 600 block of Third Street for a suspected marihuana grow. Officer Hergert had first detected the odor of growing marihuana in the area while on routine patrol a few days earlier. He and other officers were able to pinpoint the odor to a particular residence and secured a search warrant. Upon service of the warrant, twenty plants and almost five pounds of marihuana were seized. The homeowners were not present but later claimed "medical marihuana". The male resident's authorization was not properly posted and it appeared the female resident did not have an authorization at all. The case was forwarded to the county prosecutor for felony charges.
- Officers arrested a 25-year old Hoquiam female on July 16, 2011 at 0410 hours for "causing an unnecessary emergency response" after she called dispatch to report an apparent domestic violence assault in progress in the 300 block of Ontario Street. Officers determined the female had called in a false report on her ex-boyfriend and his new girlfriend. The suspect was cited and then booked at Aberdeen PD on several outstanding Aberdeen warrants.
- On July 24, 2011 at 2048 hours, officers arrested another metal thief who was trespassing on a large plot of undeveloped property in the 1200 block of Chenault Avenue where he had previously been excluded for the same crime. Upon arrest, officers located a used meth pipe in the 54-year old Hoquiam man's pocket. He was cited for trespass and possession of drug paraphernalia.
- While on bicycle patrol on July 25, 2011 at 0104 hours, Officer Blundred noticed a prowler dressed all in black at a mill site in the 1000 block of Mill Avenue. The suspect fled the area, but Officer Blundred did find a pick-up hidden in the brush nearby with metal scrap and parts stolen from the premises. The vehicle was impounded, but the suspect was never located.
- On July 26, 2011 at 1050 hours, a 38-year old Lakewood woman was visiting the YMCA and removed her \$5000 wedding ring to put on some hand lotion. She inadvertently left the ring on a counter and discovered it gone a few minutes later. Sgt. Strong took the initial report and worked with YMCA staff and video to track down anyone who had access to the locker room during the short time period. Det. Sgt. Krohn then assisted with the case and was able to track down some day-pass patrons with juveniles who came to swim for the day. One of the juveniles admitted to "finding" the ring and it was promptly returned. The victim was so happy that she immediately drove to the station to collect her ring and donated \$250 to the department's canine program.

BUDGET:

- As a result of the sudden closure of Grays Harbor Paper at the very end of May, the city and the police department immediately froze certain expenditures in the 2011-2012 budget. Two open positions within the department (the deputy chief and a patrolman) are being held as well as funds for future patrol car purchases. By the end of July, and as a result of close budgetary management within the department, police (001-08) was under-budget by \$122,589. The department continues to closely monitor expenditures.
- Costs associated with city prisoners took a huge spike in July as the department paid \$11,700 for the pre-paid bed contract at the Grays Harbor County Jail and also received a bill from the City of Forks for \$11,160. This was the largest single-month bill from Forks in recent memory. Several inmates were held on long-term mandatory sentencing. As the weekend warrant sweeps continue, the court is also tending to hold defendants who have a long track record of not appearing. There were also several medical charges for inmates in city custody which will hopefully be resolved at 47.3% of the list cost (per state statute).
- As the current patrol car fleet is aging, the department was hit with several repairs on the older vehicles- including both of the 2007 Ford Crown Victoria sedans (which are now approaching 100,000 miles). Although the budget has been tightened, it will be critical to maintain a reasonable fleet rotation schedule.
- For the month of July, **200 hours** of overtime was expended as listed below. It should be noted that overtime may increase given the vacant police officer position and a patrol sergeant who is currently on light-duty and not able to work Patrol. The sergeant is now filling in on some of the administrative duties left by the open deputy chief position. Currently, this leaves two officers short in the Patrol Division during the heavy vacation-request season:

#### PERSONNEL:

- Sgt. Wertanen was on light-duty during the month whereby he assisted with administrative duties (as left by the vacant deputy chief position). He was also the acting department administrator during the chief's vacation.
- On August 1<sup>st</sup>, Detective Gary Bryant completed his 10<sup>th</sup> year of service with the department. Administrative Assistant Candi Wertanen completed her 25<sup>th</sup> year.
- Officer Daniel McCartney was selected as "Officer of the Second Quarter" by the Hoquiam Police Officer's Association.
- For the month of July, each of the officers completed a four-hour Emergency Vehicle Operator's Course (EVOC) held at the old Weyerhaeuser log sorting yard in South Aberdeen. The training sessions were scheduled over several days and also included officers from

Montesano, Cosmopolis and the Pacific County Sheriff's Office. The program was coordinated by Officer David Peterson who was assisted by an EVOC instructor from Montesano and Pacific County. The training included policy review, pursuit skills, vehicle control and maneuvering, backing skills and emergency evasive actions. The department applied for a \$750 reimbursement from the city's insurance carrier toward the overtime costs; WCIA provides the funds annually as an incentive in support of this important training.

#### FACILITIES/ EQUIPMENT:

- Although not a budgeted item, the department started to replace the burned-out intercom system into the jail. The unit (installed in 1981) finally stopped working. The replacement unit was purchased through Harbor Electronics at around \$2200 plus installation labor. Unfortunately, the cost of the installation will be dependent on the existing conduit runs through the concrete block walls into the jail and could become extensive. The city electrician is scheduled to assist with the project as he has time. It is critical the jail has sight and audio monitoring of prisoners.
- The department finally deployed the radar trailer which was purchased on grant from the Washington Traffic Safety Commission. The decals were added by Image Signs and the unit was upgraded from a one battery to a four battery charging system under another grant. The unit should work for several days off the four deep-cycle batteries. The unit will be deployed to areas of speeding issues or citizen complaints. The unit can be transported with the Patrol SUVs as well as the CRIME WATCH vehicle.

#### VOLUNTEERS:

- For the month of July, CRIME WATCH members volunteered a total of 119 hours of service- including 63.5 hours on residential patrols, 6 office hours and 49.5 other hours- to include security at River Fest and the Push Rod show. During the regular July meeting, volunteer Wes Goings received his 500-hour award; coordinator Betsy Seidel received a "Chief's Award" for her outstanding work and organization in setting up and running the program since the 2007 inception.
- The youth Police Explorer Post, under the direction of Officer David Blundred, now has six active members. The Explorers continue to undergo training and have been on ride-alongs with officers on regular patrol shifts. Their uniforms (completely funded through a grant from the Kelsey Foundation) are now almost complete. For the month, the Explorers contributed 155 hours of time to the department, to include training, meetings and ride-alongs. To date, the Explorers are at 438 hours of service.

#### STATISTICAL REPORTS:


The following statistical reports encompass police activity for the month of July 2011. The first statistical report titled "Law Incident Analysis, Time Reported" is a summary of each law incident by the day of the week and by the time of day.

The second statistical report is a listing of "Law Total Incident Report, by Location Code". The three general areas of the city are designated by location codes: HPD Baker 6 is defined as the east end, HPD Baker 7 is the downtown area and west to the high school, and HPD Baker 8 is the north end of town from Emerson Ave. Any location codes that are outside of the city were likely generated as a result of phone call requests to the station or assists to other agencies.

The third statistical report, "Total Law Incident Report, by Nature of Incident" shows the total for each of the basic law incident types handled by the department.

The final two monthly reports included in this packet are "Total Traffic Citation Report, by Violation" and "Total Offense Report, By Statute Description". The first report lists the specific infraction or criminal charge and the number of violations issued under that charge. The second report is reflective of the number of "arrests" made under each statute. The two reports may overlap on some misdemeanor offenses if an arrest/booking was made followed by the issuance of a criminal citation. The second report captures felony arrests, but may not include misdemeanor or felony cases that were submitted to the prosecutor for review of charges (cases cleared without an arrest).


