MONTHLY REPORT FOR SEPTEMBER 2012

POLICE ACTIVITY:

- The department handled 1337 law incidents for the month, issued 77 infractions, 40 criminal traffic citations, 32 criminal citations, 6 parking infractions and made 166 criminal arrests.
- During the month, Animal Control Officer Bob Hill handled 62 "animal problem" complaints, 7 abandoned vehicles, 7 code enforcement issues and 10 parking complaints. A total of 27 animals were impounded.
- **On 09-04-2012** at 0312 hours, Officer Hergert contacted two males in the area of Maple and Adams Street dressed in dark clothing and wearing gloves. They claimed to be out "exercising" at three in the morning. Officer Hergert checked their identities and discovered one was wanted on a felony warrant. The suspect was arrested at which time the other man admitted they were in the actually process of walking to the old Lamb's property to steal metal when stopped by the police. Officer Hergert's contact likely prevented a burglary.
- **WEEKEND JAIL SESSION #10:** The open jail session was set to start on September 7th, but due to a series of arrests, the jail was opened early on September 5th. It was more cost effective to hire temporary correction officers for the two days than to book the inmates into the county jail. The jail remained open through court on September 18th. During the jail opening, a total of **68** inmates were booked into the jail on a combination of warrants, court commitments and new charges; 16 inmates were females and 52 were males. Three subjects reported for court commitments and 12 were booked on new charges. Fourteen inmates were able to post bail to secure their release; the court collected \$20,350 in bail. Fifteen inmates were taken to court on September 11th and nine were held-over on bail. On September 18th, sixteen inmates were transported to court and two were held-over on bail before being transferred to the Forks Jail. With the extended jail opening, the department decided to start accepting Department of Correction probation violators under the "Swift and Certain" program. Seventeen DOC inmates were booked during this period, allowing the city to bill the state \$4,320. This was an excellent way to resolve procedural, paperwork and billing issues before the jail is open on a full time basis under the DOC contract.
- **On 09-15-2012** at 0730 hours officers responded to a robbery call at a coffee stand in the 800 block of Simpson Avenue. A male subject concealing his face with a green bandana attempted to rob the business at gunpoint. The victim ducked into the back of the building, forcing the suspect to flee without any cash. Later in the day, another robbery was reported at a coffee stand in the 2600 block of Sumner Avenue in Aberdeen. The description of the suspect and bandana disguise was very similar to the earlier robbery attempt in Hoquiam.
- **On 09-17-2012** officers responded to a robbery at Twin Star Credit Union in the 300 block of Ontario Street. The male suspect fled westbound down an alley after obtaining cash from a teller; no weapon was displayed, only a note demanding money. HPD, APD and GHCSO officers established containment in the area and a canine search was conducted. Evidence

discarded by the suspect was located in a carport just west of the robbery location. Officers reviewed surveillance video footage and recognized the suspect as a 29-year old Hoquiam man even though he tried change his facial appearance. Officers realized the suspect was associated with an apartment less than two blocks from the credit union. Officers established surveillance of the apartment as HPD and APD detectives worked to positively identify the suspect. It was soon discovered the suspect in the bank robbery was the same suspect as the Aberdeen coffee stand robbery. APD secured a search warrant for the apartment and later used their SWAT team to serve it. Unfortunately the suspect was not present, but associated evidence was recovered from the apartment. A felony robbery warrant was issued for the suspect and the departments are currently working with the US Marshal's Office to locate him; it is believed he has fled the state.

- **On 09-17-2012** at about 0330 hours, patrol officers located a 22-year old Hoquiam man near a business in the 200 block of Lincoln Street. Officers recognized man as wanted by APD for a robbery case (not related to the above incidents). When contacted, the suspect climbed into a van and tried to hide. Officers pulled the man from the van and he attempted to flee before he was restrained. He was charged with resisting arrest before being turned over to APD detectives.
- **On 09-19-2012** at about 0940 hours, officers were dispatched to a burglary in progress at a residence in the 2400 block of Cherry Street. There was a green SUV parked in the driveway with a female reportedly taking items from the fenced yard area. Officers contacted the female who was very argumentative and evasive; she provided false names and changed her story several times. Officers noted the vehicle contained numerous items, including mail which appeared to belong to several other people around the county. While at the scene, APD was dispatched to a stolen vehicle complaint which turned out to be the green SUV the woman had driven to the burglary. She was arrested and fingerprinted at the city jail; in less than an hour the electronic fingerprint scanner provided her true identity as a 43-year old Aberdeen woman. While in a holding cell awaiting transport to the county jail for burglary and possession of a stolen vehicle, the suspect climbed up onto a sink and tore a light fixture out of the ceiling; she then attempted to assault PSO Kinney. She was subsequently booked on numerous felony charges.
- **On 09-20-2012** at about 2134 hours, Officer McCartney recognized a 25-year old Taholah man who had HMC warrants for his arrest. As the officer came around the block, the suspect disappeared. Officer McCartney contacted two males standing by a pickup and asked where the man had gone; he was told "if you look you will find him". Officer McCartney found the man hiding inside the truck and had to remove him from the vehicle. The suspect then attempted to flee before being restrained. The suspect claimed he was not trying to fight, only get away. He was booked in the county jail for the warrants and resisting arrest.
- **On 09-21-2012** at about 1332 hours, Sgt. Salstrom was on routine patrol on Endresen Road when he saw a male on an off-road vehicle at the boat launch. As Sgt. Salstrom pulled into the parking lot to contact the man, the rider suddenly drove off at a high rate of speed. Sgt. Salstrom conducted a short pursuit of the quad until the suspect turned off the street onto a trail. Sgt. Salstrom and Chief Myers walked the trail from Endresen Road to the SR109 bypass at Longren Pass without success. The suspect likely crossed all the way over from Endresen on the trail and then down the highway to escape.
- **On 09-21-2012**, former Boy Scout executive James Rutz was sentenced to 60-days in jail for felony theft in the second degree for stealing money from the local Sea Scout troop while acting as the group's treasurer. He was also ordered to pay \$2,201.26 in restitution.

- **On 09-29-2012**, the department was again a host site for the DEA Drug Take-Back program. Officer Gaddis staffed the lobby between 1000 and 1400 hours to collect unwanted or expired medication for safe disposal. The department collected 57 pounds of medication! This was the fifth event HPD hosted and was the only site in Grays Harbor. To date, HPD has collected 485 pounds of medication; nationally, the DEA program has collected over two million pounds of unwanted medications for safe disposal.

PERSONNEL:

- Officer Blodgett attended the National Tactical Officer's Conference in Seattle. The training was designed for defensive tactics to counter combative subjects.
- Officer Figg attended Pre-Supervisor training held in Port Angeles. The training is required for all department officers-in-charge (OIC) who supervise a patrol shift when the assigned shift sergeant is absent.
- Deputy Chief Wertanen was hosted at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in Brunswick, Georgia. He was asked to participate in review of curriculum for a class he previously attended. The airfare, travel and all expenses were covered by FLETC. The department's relationship with FLETC has allowed the department to facilitate several free advanced training courses for agencies in our region. The next course is a digital photography course at HPD in December which includes a free digital camera for each agency.
- Deputy Chief Wertanen completed Middle Management training through the Criminal Justice Training Commission. The course was 40-hours of problem-based learning designed for police administrators. He then completed a 16-hour course titled "Finding the Leader in You". With the core 40-hour course and other advanced leadership training, DC Wertanen will be able to apply for his Middle Management Career Certification from the Criminal Justice Training Commission once he has completed a year in his current position.
- The department hosted a Railroad Grade Crossing Collision Investigation course instructed by the state patrol and railroad police agents. The training consisted of classroom at the station meeting/ training room followed by hands-on training at the Port of Grays Harbor with locomotives and railcars. Officers from HPD and local agencies attended the course.
- Officer Peterson assisted the HHS cheerleaders with a traffic safety event in the parking lot of the YMCA on September 15th. Teens were invited to drive a course in the county traffic safety

task force's "impaired driving simulator". After driving the course normally, the teens then wore goggles which simulated being intoxicated and tried the course again. The entire program is geared to be fun, but at the same time gave teens a real-life impact of the dangers of driving impaired.

- Officer Luce celebrated his 4th year with the department on September 18th. He was a lateral hire officer from Cosmopolis PD. Officer Luce has been a great asset as a street officer, gang liaison officer and member of Sgt. Mitchell's squad (who tackle most of the computer and technology upgrades for the department).

FACILITIES/EQUIPMENT:

- Sgt. Mitchell, Officer Luce, Officer McCartney and Explorer Bradley completed the installation of the new IP surveillance cameras at the department. These department members worked many hours on and off-duty to complete this project- including pulling new network cable, removing the old video cameras and installing the new cameras in the prior as well as new locations. The exterior of the station, station lobby and the jail area are now well covered with what will be a total of 16 cameras. They should be commended to taking on this monumental task.
- The department purchased a new, large commercial freezer for the jail. It was needed to hold all the extra meals that will be needed for the jail population once the facility is in full operation. Unfortunately, the freezer was larger than anticipated, therefore PSO Kinney and temporary Corrections Officer Sireess ended up having to remove the back laundry door and doorsill just to get it inside.
- The new Jail Office is nearly complete and is currently being used by PSO Kinney. Two work stations were added to the larger room in anticipation of additional police services officers once the jail is open. PSO Kinney's old office was repainted and converted into a formal interview room. The old animal control office was turned into a jail pantry to include a spare freezer and refrigerator. ACO Hill is now sharing an office with CRIME WATCH at the far end of the building.
- The electric lock system at the station is complete and all the exterior locks have been re-keyed. The facility had not been re-keyed in many years and there was absolutely no key control or log, including the doors leading to the jail. The main doors now have electronic locks and personal key codes issued to each staff member which should limit the need to re-key in the future.

VOLUNTEERS:

- For the month, CRIME WATCH members volunteered a total of **183 hours** of service, which included residence/ business checks and assisting with traffic control at Logger's Playday.
- For the month, the Hoquiam Police Explorers logged a total of **142 hours** of service. A total of 72 hours was riding with officers on patrol; the explorers also assisted with foot patrol security and traffic control for Logger's Playday. As noted previously, Explorer Keaton Bradley contributed 54 hours personally as he assisted with technology upgrades at the station- including the new camera system, locks and troubleshooting ongoing computer issues/ upgrades. Keaton has proven himself to be very knowledgeable and helpful with computer and technology issues.

STATISTICAL REPORTS:

The following statistical reports encompass police activity for the month. The first statistical report titled "Law Incident Analysis, Time Reported" is a summary of each law incident by the day of the week and by the time of day.

The second statistical report is a listing of "Law Total Incident Report, by Location Code". The three general areas of the city are designated by location codes: HPD Baker 6 is defined as the east end, HPD Baker 7 is the downtown area and west to the high school, and HPD Baker 8 is the north end of town from Emerson Avenue. Any location codes that are outside of the city were likely generated as a result of phone call requests to the station, traffic safety patrols or agency assists.

The third statistical report, "Total Law Incident Report, by Nature of Incident" shows the total for each of the basic law incident types handled by the department.

The final two monthly reports included in this packet are "Total Traffic Citation Report, by Violation" and "Total Offense Report, By Statute Description". The first report lists the specific infraction or criminal charge and the number of violations issued under that charge. The second report is reflective of the number of "arrests" made under each statute. The two reports may overlap on some misdemeanor offenses if an arrest/booking was made followed by the issuance of a criminal citation. The second report captures felony arrests, but may not include misdemeanor or felony cases that were submitted to the prosecutor for review of charges (cases cleared without an arrest).
